inside for the plants to grow, and rain barrels help catch water for the plants. She said, "It makes me very happy to see the families producing and eating their own vegetables."



Cheese Pastry Recipe A Bolivian snack

Sift: 4 c. flour 1 t. salt 4 t. baking powder 2 T. sugar

Add: 1/2 c. margarine 1 c. warm milk 4 egg yolks (reserve whites)

Mix well. Divide dough in half. Pat out half in greased 13x9-inch pan.

In a separate bowl, beat until foamy: 4 egg whites

Add: 1/2-1 lb. Monterey Jack or similar cheese, grated

Mix. Spread half of cheese mixture on dough in pan. Pat out rest of dough on cheese layer and spread remaining cheese mixture on top. Bake at 350 F about 30 minutes until golden brown. Cut into squares to serve.

Eat with your hands
